Welsh Language Policy Polisi Iaith Gymraeg

Killay Community Council wishes to promote bilingualism where possible and practicable in all its activities.

Wales is a bilingual nation. It is a country where people can live their lives through the medium of Welsh or English. Both languages are seen, heard and used in local communities. Most people in Killay can place themselves on the continuum of Welsh language competency. Welsh is all around us from street and place names to the media. It is part of our own curriculum for Wales. It is part of our history and heritage.

The Local Government and Elections (Wales) Act 2021: Statutory Guidance for Community and Town Councils (Section 2.14) sets out guidance regarding the Welsh language. Community councils are not subject to the Welsh language standards deriving from the Welsh Language (Wales) Measure 2011, but 'they are expected to uphold the main principle of the Measure and treat the Welsh language no less favourably than English'.

Killay Community Council will:


1. Consider what we can reasonably do within budget limitations and with due regard to the cost of interpretation and translation to promote the use of the Welsh language in our activities.
2. Consider measures that can easily be taken using our present Welsh Language competence such as publishing bilingual posters, advertisements and headings on our website and Facebook pages and use of informal Welsh greetings at Community Council meetings.
3. Posters and advertisements to be checked by a designated person with high level of Welsh language competencies before being published on Facebook or on printed material.

4. Encourage the learning of Welsh by providing and promoting information on our website and social media pages about local Welsh classes such as Siop Siarad in Siloam Chapel and Welsh learning Apps.
5. We will ask for the support of and work with Welsh Language agencies such as Menter Iaith Abertawe to facilitate the use of Welsh.
6. Evaluate the success of the policy every three years and consider whether the adopted Welsh policy needs updating.
